DECEMBER 10, 2017: SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT

This morning the Candles of Hope and Peace were lit. The Service was presided over by the Faith Quest children and Youth. Details can be gathered by checking out the Worship Ministry Page.

DECEMBER 3, 2017: FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT

This morning we lit the candle of Hope on this first Sunday of Advent. From the worship folder:

"Memory awakens Hope - Advent is concerned with that very connection between memory and hope which is so necessary to humanity. Advent's intention is to awaken the most profound and basic emotional memory within us, namely the memory of the God who became a child. This is a healing memory; it brings hope. The purpose of the Church's year is continually to awaken the heart's memory so that it can discern the star of hope... It is the beautiful task of Advent to awaken in all of us memories of goodness and thus to open doors of hope."

Prior to the service, we sang carols. The candlelighting ceremony included the lighting of the advent candle as well as the candle for our value of the month, "SUSPENSE." Our guest speaker was Cathy Rigby from the POST Program of the Sheldon Kennedy Child Advocate Centre. One of our hymns was entitled "Advent's Hope" with words written by Rev. Peggy. Music ministry was offered by the Sanctuary Choir with Brent directing and Garrett on the piano.

NOVEMBER 12, 2017

Sunday morning marked our Remembrance Service with the laying of the wreath by Vern McKeague, Last Post and Reveille by trumpeter, Pam Breuer, and music ministry by the Chamber Choir. Betsy Wollner and Rev. Peggy, through reflection and readings, reminded us of the sacrifices made and the need for peace in our world. The Arise dance troupe offered a

prayerful response to "T'iru Nebri." Thank you, Emily Martin, Maryn Bjorndahl, Jessalyn Britton and Pam Breuer, for sharing in our service.

NOVEMBER 5, 2017

COMPASSION, the Value of the Month, was the theme of the service Sunday morning. The Sanctuary Choir selections enhanced the service. Rev. Peggy picked up on Alison's Faith Chat story last Sunday and challenged us "to fill our invisible buckets" with acts of compassion. She reminded us of the work being done by Karen Armstrong and Charter for Compassion.

OCTOBER 22, 2017"

"REFLECTING THE ESSENCE OF GOD" was the theme of this morning's service. The Angel Voices offered an anthem, *Traces*, set to music by Garrett Krause and their A cappella rendition of *Ubi Caritas* by O. Gjeilo was incredible. Rev. Peggy shared her answers to the big questions like "How can we honour our divine nature?" and "Why did God create us?" and "Are we worthy of God?" Jesus taught that God was within us. God is not separate but part of us, a divine presence. We are called to reflect God's presence in our lives. We are on a journey of becoming better and better images of God. True freedom is being what we are meant to be. Namaste.

OCTOBER 15, 2017

Rev. Peggy McDonagh presided over the service today while Rev. Kelley assisted Alison Demeter with Faith Quest. This being World Food Sunday, Rev. Peggy reminded us of the struggle faced by so many in today's world to meet simple basic needs. It is impossible to consider world food shortages without recognizing the future of migration. Climate change and conflict with subsequent displacement of peoples has reached record highs (26 million yearly). Almost a billion people are on the move as they seek better lives. Most of those people are in the 15-34 years age range. Rev. Peggy reminded us of how Jesus dealt with the issues of poverty but in his time, the poor were tied to the land and migration was not allowed.

Jesus calls us to provide fair sharing of the earth, food and security. The Calgary Food Policy Council is trying to eradicate hunger in Calgary by 2030. We are reminded to eat mindfully, not be wasteful and to reduce our environmental footprint. Rev. Peggy challenged us to share what we have and experience dependence and gratitude.

"God, take my hands, take my life, ordinary as wheat or cornmeal, daily as bread- my stumbling generosity, my simple actions and find them good enough to help prepare the least for all the world's people."

OCTOBER 8, 2017

Rev. Kelley Warner presided over a joyous and gratitude-filled service Sunday morning. The Chamber Choir offered their ministry of song led by Brent with Garrett on the Piano and Claire Sharp on violin. With a focus on "Giving Thanks on Dark Days", the readings were Psalm 100, 2 Corinthians 9:6-15 and Luke 17:11-19. The Seeds of Meditation included:

OCTOBER 1, 2017

World Communion was celebrated and reflected upon at SDUC on Sunday. One of the readings shared by Bonnae McTavish was a quote from Matthew Fox, "The Eucharist is about the universe loving us unconditionally still one more time and giving itself to us in the most intimate way (as food and drink). Interconnectivity is the heart of the Eucharistic experience: God and humanity coming together, God and flesh, the flesh of wheat, wine, sunshine, soil, water, human ingenuity, stars, supernovas, galaxies, storms, fireballs- every Eucharist has a 15-billion-year sacred story that renders it holy."

SEPTEMBER 10, 2017

Rev. Peggy developed a theme of eagerness as the act of energizing the Spirit within. She explored how eagerness impacts her own life and challenged us to be mindful of how eagerness can make a difference in our lives.

SEPTEMBER 3, 2017

Rev. Kelley presided over Sunday morning's service as we launched into the month of September. The Value of the Month is "Eagerness" and it is with eagerness that we approach the coming calendar of activities and opportunities at St. David's. Her reflection, "God Calls Us," reminded us that we are all part of the ministry at St. David's.

Special music for this concluding summer service was provided by Carsten Rubeling on his trombone.

AUGUST 27, 2017

Rev. Peggy's theme Sunday morning was "Being God's Glow." As usual, Rev. Peggy's creativity gave us words to the hymn following her reflection.
