Rector's Ramblings

Pentecost is one of the prominent feasts in the Christian liturgical year commemorating the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Disciples of Christ after the Resurrection. The feast is also called Whitsunday especially in the United Kingdom. Pentecost is celebrated seven weeks (50 days) after Easter Sunday, hence its name. Pentecost falls on the tenth day after Ascension Thursday.

Pentecost is historically and symbolically related to the Jewish harvest festival of Shavuot, which commemorates God giving the Ten Commandments at Mount Sinai fifty days after the Exodus. Among Christians,

Pentecost commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles and other followers of Jesus as described in the New Testament Acts of the Apostles 2:1-31. For this reason, Pentecost is sometimes described as the "Birthday of the Church".


What makes it better that the King James or the NIV?


The Anglican Church of Canada uses the New Revised Standard Version. Rooted in the past, but right for today, the NRSV continues the tradition of William Tyndale, the King James Version, the American Standard Version, and the Revised Standard Version. Equally important, it sets a new standard for the 21st Century. The NRSV stands out among the many translations because it is "as literal as possible" in adhering to the ancient texts and only "as free as necessary" to make the meaning clear in graceful, understandable English. It draws on newly available sources that increase our understanding of many previously obscure biblical passages. These sources include newfound manuscripts, the Dead Sea Scrolls, other texts, inscriptions, and archaeological finds from the ancient Near East, and new understandings of Greek and Hebrew grammar.

The NRSV differs from the RSV in four primary ways: updating the language of the RSV, by replacing archaic

forms of speech addressed to God (Thee, Thou, wast, dost, etc.), and by replacing words whose meaning has changed significantly since the RSV translation (for example, Paul's statement in 2 Corinthians 11.25 that he was "stoned" once) making the translation more accurate, helping it to be more easily understood, especially when it is read out loud, and making it clear where the original texts intend to include all humans, male and female, and where they intend to refer only to the male or female gender.

Many of you want your own Bible - to follow the Readings, to reflect on the scriptures before next Sunday, to engage in discussion. Polly is researching availability, format & prices, which seem to range from \$14.99 to \$25.95. Some online book sellers offer a discount for a bulk purchase.








Email Prayer Chain

Since the inception of the Truth and Reconciliation Committee, we have been trying to find a visual on the Internet that expresses our intentions, but with no luck. In the end we decided to create our own and here it is. The wonderful design and execution is Sheila Barker's who also donated the cost of having the logo made print-ready. The words are self-explanatory; the figures reflect the connectedness of all peoples, regardless of race, and the talking stick which is

modeled on one presented to Jim Wilson in recognition of his work in restorative justice in Mission, represents our need to listen as well as speak in our efforts at reconciliation. We hope this image will inspire you all to participate in the events we have planned for this year.

We continue our work on reconciliation (or as Rene Inkster puts it, Reconciliaction) this year with a number of activities for our congregation to participate in.

On April 24 The Scholarship Ceremony and Feast was held again this year where Mission School District acknowledges aboriginal student success with a feast. All Saints presented two scholarships.


Celebrating our Connections with Indigenous People

As last year, smudging will be offered in the chapel and there will be displays, drumming and a speaker during the service. The special offering will be dedicated to our annual Truth and Reconciliation scholarships for 2020.



SERMON ON THE AMOUNT



We have now come to the end of April and Parish Council felt that we should give you an overview of how we are doing financially with our Income and Expenses from **January 1 to April 28, 2019** as well as the budget to date.

This gives us a \$2,366.68 difference between the total income and the budget numbers that we hoped to be close to by this point. As you can see most of the shortfall is in our envelope giving. This includes the general Sunday giving being lower than usual and since the Rector's Discretionary was in need of funds the Easter giving was directed to that fund so that now we are short \$500.00 that was budgeted for the Easter giving. In the Miscellaneous we were given funds by VanCity to pay for the Lighter Living workshop that was held at All Saints last month.

This gives us a \$2,355.90 difference between the total expenses and the budget numbers. It is rather interesting that the difference between the budget numbers and the income and expense numbers are almost exact. The main reasons for the extra costs in Building and Grounds is due to the rise in gas prices which has doubled our budgeted amount and to a lesser degree the electrical costs were due in part to the dehumidifiers and electrical tools after The Flood. The Miscellaneous expense is for the costs incurred for the Lighter Living Workshop and paid for by VanCity and the budget amount for that line is for any seminars or training which hasn't been used yet.

Question: "Why is giving thanks to God important?"

Answer: The Bible is filled with commands to give thanks to God (<u>Psalm 106:1</u>; <u>107:1</u>; <u>118:1</u>; <u>1 Chronicles 16:34</u>; <u>1 Thessalonians 5:18</u>). Most verses go on to list reasons why we should thank Him, such as "His love endures forever" (<u>Psalm 136:3</u>), "He is good" (<u>Psalm 118:29</u>), and "His mercy is everlasting" (<u>Psalm 100:5</u>). Thanksgiving and praise always go together. We cannot adequately praise and <u>worship</u> God without also being thankful.

Feeling and expressing appreciation is good for us. God wants us to learn to be thankful for all the gifts He has given us (<u>James 1:17</u>). It is in our best interest to be reminded that everything we have is a gift from Him. Without gratefulness, we become arrogant and self-centered. We begin to believe that we have achieved everything on our own. Thankfulness keeps our hearts in right relationship to the Giver of all good gifts.

Giving thanks also reminds us of how much we do have. Human beings are prone to covetousness. We tend to focus on what we *don't* have. By giving thanks continually we are reminded of how much we *do* have. When we focus on blessings rather than wants, we are happier. When we start thanking God for the things we usually take for granted, our perspective changes. We realize that we could not even exist without the merciful blessings of God.

<u>First Thessalonians 5:18</u> says, "In everything give thanks; for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus." We are to be thankful not only for the things we like, but for the circumstances we don't like. When we purpose to thank God for everything that He allows to come into our lives, we keep bitterness at bay. We cannot be both thankful and bitter at the same time. We do not thank Him for evil, but that He is sustaining us through it (<u>James 1:12</u>). We don't thank Him for harm He did not cause, but we thank Him when He gives us the strength to endure it (<u>2 Corinthians 12:9</u>). We thank Him for His promise that "all things will work together for the good, to those who love God and are called according to His purpose" (<u>Romans 8:28</u>).

We can have thankful hearts toward God even when we do not feel thankful for the circumstance. We can grieve and still be thankful. We can hurt and still be thankful. We can be angry at sin and still be thankful toward God. That is what the Bible calls a "sacrifice of praise" (<u>Hebrews 13:15</u>). Giving thanks to God keeps our hearts in right relationship with Him and saves us from a host of harmful emotions and attitudes that will rob us of the peace God wants us to experience (<u>Philippians 4:6–7</u>).

Little Saints of All Saints

A New Wind Blowing



Theme: The Holy Spirit. (Pentecost Sunday)

Scripture: When the day of Pentecost came, they were all together in one place. Suddenly a sound like the blowing of a violent wind came from heaven and filled the whole house where they were sitting. They saw what seemed to be tongues of fire that separated and came to rest on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit enabled them. Acts 2:1-4 (NIV)

How many of you like to fly kites? It is great fun to watch a kite soaring high into the sky. What is it that keeps the kite up there? It is the wind, isn't it? How many of you have ever seen the wind? That was a trick question! No one has seen the wind. We can't see the wind because it is invisible. Well, if we can't see the wind, how do we know that it is there?

One way we can know the wind is there is that we can hear it. When I wake up in the morning, I sometimes turn on the TV to see what the weather is doing. There are some mornings that I don't even have to look at the TV to know that the wind is blowing because I can hear it! I can hear it whistling through the trees, down the chimney, and around the windows and doors. We can't see the wind, but we know it is there because we can hear it.

Another way we can know that the wind is there is that we can see it moving things. (Take some bits of paper in your hand and blow them into the air.) We can see it moving the leaves on the trees and blowing bits of paper around. We can't see the wind, but we know it is there because we can see what the wind is doing.

Still another way we can know that the wind is there is that we can feel it. Blow onto the back of your hand. Did you see anything? No, but you could feel something, couldn't you? We can't see the wind, but we can feel it blowing against our faces and blowing through our hair.

Today, many churches celebrate a special day called Pentecost. It was on the day of Pentecost that God sent his Holy Spirit to the church. The Bible tells us that the apostles were all gathered together when suddenly there was a sound like a mighty, rushing wind. Then, it says, they were filled with the Holy Spirit. God's Holy Spirit is like the wind, we can't see him, but we can know that he is there, just like we can know that the wind is there.

We can know that the Holy Spirit is there because we can hear him. The Bible says, "Behold, I stand at the door and knock, and if any man hears my voice and opens the door, I will come in to him." (Revelation 3:20) We can't see the Holy Spirit, but we know he is there because he speaks to our

hearts.

Another way we can know that the Holy Spirit is there is that we can see him moving people to do God's will. The Bible says that the Spirit of God moves his people to speak and to do things for him. (2 Peter 1:21) We can't see God, but we can see people doing things that God's Holy Spirit has moved them to do.

We can know that the Holy Spirit is there because we can feel his presence. The Bible says, "I will fear no evil for Thou art with me." (Psalm 23:4) The Bible also says that "if we love one another, God lives in us." We can't see the Holy Spirit, but we know he is there because we can feel his presence in our life.

Father, thank you for sending your Holy Spirit. Even though we can't see him, we are thankful that we can hear him speak to our hearts, feel his presence in our daily lives, and see him moving us to do your will. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen.
