

Sunday July 14, 2019
Lections and Liturgical Suggestions for Use Throughout the Anglican Church of Canada

The General Synod of the Anglican Church of Canada meets this year from July 10-16, 2019 in Vancouver BC. Members of Synod will be joining parish churches in the Diocese of New Westminster on Sunday, July 14. We are mindful of the work of this General Synod, whose theme is "I have called you by name." In particular, Synod will be considering the establishment of a self-determining indigenous Church in our midst, the practice of marriage in our church, and the election of a new Primate. Because these are such important matters for our common life, we are encouraging all congregations in our Church to join with those in the host-diocese of New Westminster in using the following readings.

Isaiah 43.1-7
Psalm 139.1-9 (BAS)
2 Corinthians 5.16-20
John 20.1-18

In addition, the General Synod Worship Planning Team is pleased to commend the following resources and suggestions:

Presider Lift up your hearts.

People We lift them to the Lord.

Presider Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

People It is right to give our thanks and praise.

Presider It is indeed right, our duty and our joy,
that we should at all times and in all places
give thanks and praise to you,
almighty and merciful God,
for the glorious resurrection of our Saviour Jesus Christ,
the true Paschal Lamb who gave himself to take away our sin,
who in dying has destroyed death,
and in rising has brought us to eternal life.
And so, with Mary Magdalene and Peter
and all the witnesses of the resurrection,
with earth and sea and all their creatures,
and with angels and archangels,
cherubim and seraphim,
we praise your name and join their unending hymn:

All Holy, holy, holy, Lord,
God of power and might,
heaven and earth are full of your glory.
Hosanna in the highest.
Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.

Presider Celebrating his resurrection, we shout Amen.
People **Amen.**

Presider Trusting his presence in every time and place, we plead Amen.
People **Amen.**

send your Spirit on this meal.
O God, you are Bread:
feed us with yourself.
O God, you are Wine:
warm our hearts and make us one.
O God, you are Fire:
transform us with hope.

O God most majestic,
O God most motherly,
O God our strength and our song,
you show us a vision of a tree of life
with fruits for all
and leaves that heal the nations.
Grant us such life,
the life of the Father to the Son,
the life of the Spirit of our risen Saviour,
life in you, now and forever.
