Unable to persuade her parents that she had a religious vocation, Virginia was married at age 15 to the son of another notable Italian

family. But he gambled, lived dissolutely and died after only five years. Virginia, despite her unhappiness in the marriage, nursed him at the end. She vowed to live celibately thereafter, bringing up her two daughters and caring for abandoned children, especially girls. She founded several schools and the Sisters of Our Lady of the Refuge on Mount Calvary. She was canonized in her hometown, Genoa, in 2003.

The new Serra Club of Kamloops Diocese held their celebration at Our Lady of Perpetual Help Parish in Kamloops, BC on October 27, 2017 with a Celebration of the Eucharist, induction of members, installation of officers and a banquet. Guests included representatives of Serra International Council and of Serra Clubs of Vancouver and Fraser Valley West. The Kamloops Catholic Men's Choir led singing during the Liturgy.

Bishop Joseph Nguyen celebrated the Mass with four Diocesan priests as concelebrants. In his homily, Bishop Joseph referred to the Gospel reading (Luke 5:1-11) and emphasized the mission of Serrans, and, indeed, of all Christians, to act with humility and trust in Jesus "...to help him with his work in his Church," as did Peter. He called on the new Serrans to respond to the great need in our Church today and encouraged them to "never give up" and to involve Jesus in their efforts to "pay out (their) nets in action" and allow God "to bless us beyond our dreams."

Following the Final Blessing, Mr. Vila Nova Carvalho, President of Vancouver Serra Club and Past-President of Serra Canada Council, inducted nineteen members into the Serra movement and installed the officers and Chaplain Rev. Father Paul Simms for the Serra Club of Kamloops Diocese. He also honoured Bishop Joseph as Spiritual Leader of the Serra Club of Kamloops Diocese.

The new Serrans, representing several parishes within the Diocese, pledged to accept the objectives and purposes of Serra. Deacon Paul Murphy, President and the other officers were called to "dream big dreams and to set challenging goals" and "to help (Serra) members to fulfill their vocations to service and to promote, foster and preserve vocations to the priesthood and religious life." Bishop Joseph blessed the members and officers and led them in praying an

Act of Consecration to the Immaculate Heart of Mary.

Sixty people attended the banquet to celebrate the new Serra Club. Dignitaries and guest speakers included Mr. Vila Nova Carvalho, President of the sponsoring Vancouver Serra Club, Mr. Leo Ilomin of Fraser Valley West Serra Club, Mr. Mario Biscardi, President-elect Serra International Council, Most Reverend Joseph Nguyen and Deacon Paul Murphy. In his acceptance speech, Deacon Paul committed the members of Kamloops Diocese Serra to work diligently to achieve the objectives defined by Bishop Joseph, namely: to have seven Diocesan seminarians by 2022, to establish a Vocation Committee in each parish, and to establish a Vocation Club in each Catholic school in the Diocese.

Serra is an international Catholic lay organization for the promotion of vocations to the priesthood and consecrated life, for the affirmation of vocations, and for the spiritual development of its members. The Serra Club of Kamloops Diocese was established "in-formation" on May 27, 2017 with sponsorship from Serra Vancouver. # BC & Yukon Knights of Columbus Receive Supreme Highest Award

The British Columbia & Yukon State Council under the leadership of Arcie J. Lim, State Deputy 2015 – 2017 achieved the Pinnacle Award, the highest membership award in the Circle of Honour and the first in the history of BC & Yukon State. Lim was also the recipient of the Jean Migneault Trophy for leading the BC & Yukon jurisdiction to number one position in Canada.

We also placed second overall in North America and 5th place in the entire Order, said Lim, who received the awards at the 135th International Supreme Convention held in St. Louis, Missouri from August 1-4, 2017.

The BC & Yukon State Council donated more than \$3.8 million to various charities as of the end of the calendar year December 31, 2016. The BC & Yukon knights are currently doing various fundraising to aid those who are affected by the BC forest fires. An initial donation of \$10,000 will be presented to the Diocese of Kamloops to help fire victims. Lim mentioned that their various programs like, Coats for Kids, Food for Families, Wheelchair distribution program in partnership with the Canadian Wheelchair Foundation, support to Special Olympics and many more have made significant impact to the various recipients in the local communities and third world countries.


Supreme Knight, Carl A. Anderson, stated in his annual report that last year, the Knights of Columbus donated a new record high of \$178 million and 75 million volunteer hours worldwide. In the past three years, the Order's Christian Refugee Relief program has so far raised and donated more than \$13 million to help the persecuted and displaced Christians in Syria, Iraq and Lebanon. Donations to Youth programs totalled more than \$4.5 million including the \$1.3 million spent in support of the 2016 World Youth Day in Krakow, Poland. Over \$1.6 million went to support various Vocation programs last year. The Order spent over \$3.3 million to support Pro-life activities including a grant of \$50,000 to March for Life Canada.

The Knights of Columbus was founded in 1882 and is the largest Catholic, family, fraternal organization in the world with nearly 2 million members. Members in good standing received free fraternal and financial benefits. Its \$20 million Vicarius Fund helps support the Holy Father's personal charities throughout the world. Last year, the Pope was presented a cheque for \$1,650,000 from the Fund's earnings. The Canadian Catholic Conference of Bishops and Salt & Light television are some of the recipients of the Knights of Columbus generousity.


Bishop Joseph Nguyen has given the direction to begin a Permanent Diaconate Formation Program in the Diocese of Kamloops, effective September 2018.

It was in the realization that I needed to know more of what I believe in that drew me here to St. Therese, and so far I have not been disappointed in the least.





In the video *Fishers of Men*, someone comments that nature and humans grow in silence. A vocation also grows in silence. Today's world is inundated with noise, making it difficult to discern one's calling. The seminary offers a place for someone to enter into deep prayer and to discern God's will for him.

As I begin my second year at St. Joseph Seminary, I am able to reflect on this past year and to recognize God's graces working in my life. Although it is difficult to single out any

one aspect of seminary life, what I perhaps enjoy the most is the community life and structure in the seminary.

There are fifty men (including the priests on the formation team) who live at the seminary. 



### Witness through Prayer & Peaceful Activism



From September 27 to November 5, 2017, Choose Life 40 Day Prayer Vigil drew attention to the sacred value of life from conception to death. Through prayer and peaceful activism, participants were seeking God's favor to turn hearts and minds from a culture of death to a culture of life. As a peaceful and educational presence, they stood witness to send a powerful message about the tragic realities of abortion, euthanasia and assisted suicide.

Over 120 individuals mainly from Catholic and Orthodox churches took time from busy lives to draw attention to the value of life. Averaging over 15 people daily, praying inside and outside for up to three hours, meant the power of prayer was visible in the community. No real protest occurred during the 40 Days as did last year. However, interesting events occurred during the time.

A closed highway on one day resulted in many more people seeing the signs as the traffic backed up in the downtown area. Another day, an indigenous man asked how the Catholic Church could promote life when so many lost their lives and way through the residential school experience. In a quiet and respectful manner we talked about the sad situation which resulted from human error and how heart-breaking it is for those still recovering. He left feeling understood. A couple excitedly thanked the witnesses for life. They were on their way to meet their new adopted grandchild at the hospital. A mom had chosen life and their son's family was adopting the baby boy. Who knows how people's hearts are softened and converted by the prayers raised up during the 40 day devotion?

If one abortion, suicide or euthanasia is averted, the thousands of total hours dedicated are worthwhile. Pray continuously for Canada and our community: Holy Michael the Archangel defend us in battle, Prayer for Life, Prayer for Canada and Rosary for Life, Act of Reparation for the Sacred Heart of Jesus and other chosen prayers.

Fall is gone and winter has arrived! Fall left with a bang! Literally – on October 17th a severe wind storm downed several trees and branches including two massive willow trees on the monastery grounds. Luckily no one was hurt, (except maybe for sore backs and muscles as they cleaned up the debris) and no buildings or fences were damaged, but the power did go out!

However, the weather on October 17th did not deter a visit to the Monastery from four members of the Catholic Women's League of St. Joseph's parish in Armstrong along with several of their lady friends (14 to be exact!) from the Zion United Church in Armstrong. What a great ecumenical event it was! The United church women were curious and interested in the Sisters and the Monastery. Myself, and Guild President Bruce Lines were invited and happy to attend. I read a bit of the history about the Discalced Carmelite Order - who they were, their purpose and how they came to Armstrong. We provided information about the Guild, shared stories of answered prayer and addressed questions, giving them an idea of the Sisters life. After our talk we proceeded upstairs to the chapel for a brief look and some stayed for quick prayer. The ladies then browsed the many gifts in the foyer and purchases of jams, jellies, cards and other gifts were made. They were thrilled to see and speak with Sister while paying for their gifts. Downstairs we enjoyed more fellowship and goodies to eat. As the power was out we served 'thin, cool, tea = plain water', a description from Ria Wanner, Armstrong CWL member, who helped organize the event. Left over baked goodies remained for the Sisters to enjoy.

I strongly recommend that all our parishes, CWL councils, youth groups, etc., **consider a similar visit** to the Monastery. It is informative, interesting, spiritual and fun! All it takes is a call or email to Mother Ann, to arrange the date and time. I also suggest that you invite the Guild to attend and help with facilitating the tour and providing information. Mother Ann advises the downstairs hall area is available for meetings or visits such as this and Mass can be arranged. There is no charge – a donation may be given if you wish. The Sisters are so happy to have visitors!



One topic that came up during this visit was the process of 'answering God's call' to becoming a Nun. **Mother Ann advises:** "There are many stages for a woman wanting to be a Carmelite Nun.

- We get to know the candidate through writing and usually a visit; followed by a live-in experience, preferably at least 3 weeks but not to exceed 3 months.
- Next she may fill out an application to become a
   <u>Postulant</u>, and if she is accepted it is for one year and may be extended 6 months. She wears a simple brown and white outfit.
- If admitted to become a <u>Novice</u> she is clothed in the Carmelite Habit. Novitiate lasts for 2 years.
- After that is 'First Profession of Temporary Vows' for one year and renewed for 2 consecutive years. Temporary Vows may be extended up to nine years before making 'Final Profession'.

These stages are considered initial formation, as an **on-going formation** is important in our life. To be continually formed to the likeness of Christ our Spouse - to seek the Face of God through continual prayer. We thank you all for your support and prayers for us and for those who are asking to "come and see" that they may persevere in the grace of their calling."

At the time of this writing Mother Ann states they are dealing with clearing snow and broken branches from the first snow fall of the season, and says at least we will not be wondering whether or not we will have a white Christmas! And as the Christmas season draws closer, they look forward to packing up boxes for the Guild fundraiser at St. Joseph's Church in Salmon Arm. The jam sales are a big part of the fundraiser, and the Sisters say 'thank you' to all those who sent the 250ml jars for jam.....they can always use more!

The Guild and the Sisters are thankful to all who pray diligently for an increase to religious life; please keep praying. With the start of a new year, the Carmel of St. Joseph Guild will be looking for your membership renewals, and of course new membership are always needed and welcomed!

# **Make a Defense:**

# Defending Catholic Church Teaching with the Help of a Scripture Cheat Sheet

Rev. Dale Normandeau, Pastor at Our Lady of the Mountains in Whistler

When asked "is it possible to defend the teachings of the Catholic faith by means of scripture?" the answer is a resounding "Yes!" The problem is, many Catholics do not know which scripture verses confirm which Church teaching. To help in this, Christopher Wong, a Catholic Apologist, developed a 'scriptural cheat sheet' to enable Catholics to better defend their faith by means of scripture. I availed myself of this apologetical resource, as well as other resources, and am passing on to you some of what I gleamed from this:

### Scripture Passages that describe God as a Trinity:

**Genesis 1:26** – God speaks of himself in the plural.

**Matthew 28:19** – Call to baptize using the Trinitarian formula.

**2 Corinthians 13:14** – Triune nature of God expressed as a blessing.

**John 1:1** – The Word being with God from the beginning.

### **Scripture Passages that Describe Christ's Divinity:**

Isaiah 9:6 - Prophecy of the incarnation, whose name will be "Mighty God."

**Matthew 16:16-17** – Peter describes Jesus as "the Son of

the Living God." He is commended for his answer.

John 8:58 – Jesus speaks of himself pre-existing Abraham,

with the phrase "I Am", which is God's sacred name.

John 10:30 – "I and the Father are one."

Colossians 2:9 - In Christ is the fullness of deity.

**Hebrews 1:1-3** – Christ bears the very stamp of God's nature.

### **Scripture Verses that contradict Sola Scriptura (Scripture Alone):**

**John 21:25** – Not everything Jesus did is found in scripture.

2 Thessalonians 2:15; 2 Timothy 2:2; 1 Corinthians 11:2; 1 Thessalonians

**2:13** – In these passages, St. Paul refers to an oral (unwritten) tradition.

**2 John 1:12; 3 John 1:13-14** - The inspired author makes more references to an oral tradition.

**Acts 8: 30-31** – This verse makes the case for guidance in interpreting scripture.

**2 Peter 1:20-21** – This passage warns against private interpretation of scripture.

**2 Peter 3:16** – Another warning against private interpretation of scripture, because it can be misinterpreted.

### **Scripture Verses that contradict Sola Fide (Faith Alone):**

**James 2:14-26** – One is justified only by the presence of both faith and works.

**Hebrews 10: 26-27; Romans 8:12-13** – One must avoid sin.

Luke 6:46-49; Matthew 7:21; Matthew 19:16-21; John 5: 28-29 -

One must be engaged in doing the work and will of God to be saved.

**1 John 2:3-6; 1 John 3:24; 1 John 5:3** – One must keep the Commandments.

Philippians 2:12; 2 Corinthians 5:10; Romans 2:6-13; Matthew 25: 32-46; Galatians 6:6-10; Revelation 20:12 – These verses make the case for good works

being a prerequisite for salvation.

### Scripture Verses that contradict the sentiment 'Once Saved, Always Saved'

**Philippians 2:12** – Work out one's salvation with fear and trembling.

2 Peter 2:20-21 - The Righteous can fall.

**Hebrews 4:1** – One must take care to not fail to reach salvation.

Hebrews 10: 26-29 – Those who have been sanctified

can still lose salvation through sin.

**1 Corinthians 9:27** – St. Paul expresses the fear that he might

be damned if he does not discipline himself.

**Hebrews 6: 4-8** – It is possible for believers to lose salvation.





# **Excerpt from Pope Francis communication to young Canadians on October 22, 2017**

HIS HOLINESS POPE FRANCIS



Dear young Canadian friends!

I'm happy to be able to spend a little time with you...when people work together looking for each other's good, the world reveals itself in all its beauty. I ask you, therefore, not to let the world be ruined by those without scruples, who only think about exploiting it and destroying it. I invite you to flood the places where you live with the joy and enthusiasm typical of your youthful age, to irrigate the world and history with the joy that comes from the Gospel, from having met a Person: Jesus, who has enthralled you and has drawn you to be with Him.

Do not let your youth be stolen from you. Do not allow anyone to slow and obscure the light that Christ puts in your face and in your heart. Be weavers of relationships signed by trust, by sharing, by openness even to ends of the world. Do not raise walls of division...Build bridges, like this extraordinary one that you are crossing in spirit, and that links the shores of two oceans. You are experiencing a moment of intense preparation for the next Synod – the Synod of Bishops. Its theme is "Young people, faith and vocational discernment".

I also want to remind you of Jesus' words, those He said

one day to the disciples who asked him, "Rabbi, where do you live?" And Jesus answered, "Come and see." Jesus also turns His gaze on you and invites you to go to Him. Dear young people, have you encountered this gaze? Have you heard this voice? Have you felt that impulse to get up and be on the way? I am sure that, although din and dizziness seem to reign in the world, this call continues to resonate in your soul, to open it to full joy. This will be possible to the extent that you, through accompaniment of expert guides, undertake an itinerary of discernment in order to discover God's plan for your life...the plan He has for the life of each one of you – even when your journey is marked by danger and missteps, God, rich in mercy, tenders His hand to pick you up again.

The world, the Church, are in need of courageous young people, who are not cowed in the face of difficulties, who face their trials and keep their eyes and hearts open to reality, so that no one should be rejected or subjected to injustice or to violence, or deprived of human dignity.

Young people, let Christ reach you. Let Him speak to you, embrace you, console you, heal your wounds, dissolve your doubts and fears – and you shall be ready for the fascinating adventure of life, that precious and inestimable gift that God places every day in your hands. Go to meet Jesus, be with Him in prayer, entrust yourselves to Him, give your whole life over to His merciful love and your faith, and your faith will be the luminous witness of generosity and of the joy there is in following Him, wherever He should lead you.

Dear young people of Canada, my hope for you is that your meeting should be like that of the first disciples that the beauty of a life realized in following the Lord might open wide before you. For this reason I entrust you to Mary of Nazareth, a young person like you, to whom God turned His loving gaze that He might take you by the hand. Let yourselves be taken by Mary's, and let her guide you to the joy of saying a full and generous, "Here I am!" Jesus watches you and awaits a "Here I am!" from each of you. I bless you, I embrace you, and I greet you with affection while I ask you, please, to pray for me, so that I may be a faithful cooperator with your joy.




# A Successful Faith in Action Campaign for the Armstrong Parish
