We have reviewed the accompanying summarized financial statements, which comprise the summarized statement of financial position as at December 31, 2018, and the summarized statement of operations for the year then ended are derived from the complete financial statements of the Roman Catholic Bishop of Kamloops for the year ended December 31, 2018 on which we prepared our review engagement dated April 23, 2019 with a qualified conclusion related to donation and fundraising activities.

Management's Responsibility of the Summarized Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these summarized financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Practitioner's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express a conclusion on the accompanying summarized financial statements based on our procedures, which were conducted in accordance with the applicable Assurance Guideline of the Chartered Professional Accountants of Canada with respect to summarized financial statements.

Conclusion

Based on our review, nothing has come to our attention that causes us to believe that these summarized financial statements, derived from the complete financial statements of the Roman Catholic Bishop of Kamloops for the year ended December 31, 2018, are not a fair summary of those financial statements, in accordance with the criteria described in the Guideline referred above.

Emphasis of Matter

The summarized financial statements do not contain all the disclosures required by Canadian Accounting Standards for Not-for-Profit Organizations. Reading the summary financial statements, therefore, is not a substitute for reading the complete financial statements of the Roman Catholic Bishop of Kamloops.







If people today are to find Jesus, we must make him visible to them. With



Catholic Women's League of Canada --Kamloops Diocesan Council

The Kamloops Diocese was well represented at the BC & Yukon Provincial Convention of the Catholic Women's League held in Nanaimo, June 13–15; and our National Convention held in Calgary Alberta, August 18–21.

Delegates of the Provincial Convention, under the provincial theme—'Witnessing to the Truth'—heard from several amazing speakers: Amber Zole, from CCO (Catholic Christian Outreach) addressed this them stating that a poll in 2017 indicated that 49% of Canadians are non-believing! She advised the most effective means to evangelize or build relationships is through 'witness', giving us 10 ways to accomplish this and to remember that as a successful witness we need to: 'take the initiative, motivate others, trust in the Holy Spirit and leave the results to God'. www.cco.ca

Alissa Golob, co-founder of a new pro-life political organization called 'Right Now', with a presentation titled '**Pro-Life Politicians—How to Elect Them'**, was very appropriate with Federal election slated for October 21st. She stated that J Trudeau is the first Prime Minister to disallow pro-life people from running for office. Website: **www.itstartsrightnow.ca**

We were blessed to hear moving and inspirational presentations from the <u>Snaw-Naw-Was First Nations</u> and school personnel on an educational initiative titled SYEYUTSUS—meaning '**Walking Together**'. Bishop Gary Gordon along with Joan Brown and other elders from the Nanaimo area also addressed this project, it is all about witnessing together—wisdom, knowledge and truth—to protect and care for creation and one another – in line with our National theme.

<u>Anna Hudson</u>, addressed elder abuse in her workshop titled "**It's Not Right, Neighbours, Friends and Family**"—an important and critical issue in our society today.

We also heard from, <u>Fr. David John</u> our Provincial CWL Spiritual Advisor, giving his usually inspirational talk—riddled with humour and love.

The 99th National Convention was centered on our National theme 'Care for our Common Home' with presentations and breakout sessions, allowing the 850 attendees opportunities to hear a variety of speakers. Titles included: Living Laudato Si—Practical Tools on How We Can Care for our Common

Home; Spiritual Practice and Care for Common Home; What the Catholic Church Says about Care for Creation; and A Carbon Conversation – Why is it So Hard to Change? How can we Respond to the Cry of the Poor? The main keynote speaker was <u>Sr. Dorothy Ederer</u>, Grand Rapids Dominican Sister and Catholic Chaplain at Holy Cross Services, with humour, life stories of miracles, struggles and joy she addressed "What is our Common Home?: We care for our homeland, our homes, our hearts."

Business sessions of conventions included—passing of resolutions, reports and updates from a variety sources—including our national CWL Strategic Planning process—Future of the League, Year One; executive and chairpersons reports, Catholic Women's Leadership Foundation, WUCWO (World Union of Catholic Women's Organization) and the Catholic Health Alliance of Canada. We also heard from the following organizations that were presented with donations collected from members through the National Voluntary funds: Catholic Missions in Canada; CNEWA (Catholic Near East Welfare Associations or Christians in the Holy Land); COADY International (support of education for the underprivileged); Euthanasia Prevention Coalition, (Alex Schadenberg director).

No convention is complete without the beautiful opening and closing Masses, the amazing spiritual programs given each day, including Memorial Service for deceased members and the celebration of new 'life members'; the love and laughter shared by new and reacquainted friendships. Offering special events/ tours, amazing food/banquets, entertainment, (like the provincial beach party—ooh la la, and the national western shin dig—Yahoo!), raffles, door prizes, 50/50 draws and shopping or gathering information from the tables and displays of various vendors and organizations! **Wow!! Truly conventions** have it all! An experience that provides everyone with the information, inspiration, hope and joy to bring back to their communities as we strive to meet our goals of faith, service and social justice. 




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Ellie Rosario

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
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Lorissa Hohmann

You have nothing to lose by giving Him your desires, for "He takes nothing away from you, but instead helps you find all that you need, and in the best possible way" (Christus Vivit, 131). Our desires are good, and at the root of every desire- if we dig deep enough- is God. When we permit the enemy to get a hold of our desires, he twists and distorts them, and then we fall short of the glory that God wants to bring about through the pursuit of our desires. God is constantly speaking to us through our desires, but do we seek Him in the silence of our hearts so that we can actually hear Him? I feel that by inviting God into every moment of my day, I am able to catch little glimpses of how He is revealing His love for me in the small and often ordinary things. Do not be afraid of



falling in love with God, for He is relentlessly pursing your heart! May the Peace of Christ be with you always!

Reflection on Last Year's Seminary Experience

A common question I am asked outside the seminary is; how was your year? It is a fine question, but usually asked in a way that anticipates a brief response. While it is true to say 'my last year in seminary was good,' I think it can be misleading. I think some people may hear that and think 'following my vocation ought to be always good and joyful and I should be absolutely sure of what the next step is.'

The truth is my last year in seminary was tough. I truly believe God is calling me to the priesthood, but I do not have any rock-solid guarantee. I was shaken by the various scandals erupting in the States and throughout the world. I am pained by the conspiracies and rumours about the pope and hierarchy circulating. When I look at the Kamloops diocese and its particular struggles, its shortage of priests and resources I waver like how St. Peter began to sink when he noticed the storm around him (Mt. 14:28-31).

But you know the interesting part of this Bible story? We usually remember it as another one of St. Peter's shortcomings and I think we forget the fact that St. Peter was WALKING ON WATER!!! Even if it was for just a few

Make Your Defense: Mary the Mother of God

This series of essays on Mary begins with a reflection on her greatest title: Mother of God. This title slips off our lips so easily, that it is difficult for us today to appreciate the burning controversy that arose around this Marian title during the fifth century.

The controversy began in 428 A.D. when the Patriarch of Constantinople, Nestorius, preached a series of sermons describing Mary as the mother of the human Christ, but not the mother of the Second Person of the Trinity. He denied her the title of Theotokos (God-bearer in Greek). Although it was not Nestorius' intention, his misunderstanding of Christ's nature and personhood seems to imply that Jesus Christ was two people: the divine Second Person of the Trinity and the human Jesus born of Mary, Mary, according to Nestorius, while being the mother of the human Jesus, is therefore not the Mother of God. This premise became the heresy that bears his name— Nestorianism.

At the heart of the Nestorian heresy is a philosophical problem: how can Mary, a created human person brought into existence in time, give birth to God, who is a divine person, the ground of all being and therefore uncreated, who has neither beginning nor end? It is the tendency of heretics, however, to overthink such questions and provide them with inadequate answers. A Church Council would be needed to provide a response to Nestorian's heresy.

In 431 A.D., Catholic bishops gathered in Ephesus to convene an Ecumenical (world-wide) Council. They condemned Nestorianism by affirming that Jesus was not two persons but one person having both a divine and human nature. This is known as the *hypostatic union*, which means Christ's divinity and humanity are united in one *hypostasis*, or individual existence. As Jesus Christ is one person, human and divine, it follows that Mary gave birth to God and is rightly called Mother of God. The Council of Ephesus therefore affirmed Mary's title, Mother of God (Theotokos), as right and proper. Nestorius retired to a monastery where he later recanted his Nestorian heresy.


A more fundamental issue arising from the Nestorian heresy, perhaps one that even Nestorius himself did not foresee, was its attack on Soteriology, or the theology of salvation. If Mary is not the Mother of God and Jesus Christ, born of her, is therefore not God, then he cannot be a perfect sacrifice for sin, for only God alone can offer a perfect efficacious sacrifice for sin. If Jesus was only a man, then his death on the cross did not acquire salvation for sinful humanity. Nestorianism makes Christ's sacrifice ineffective and, therefore, our salvation through him impossible.

It becomes clear that Mary's title, Mother of God, must necessarily be given her as it means that Jesus Christ is a divine person, the Second Person of the Divine Trinity, who has a divine and human nature. The meaning behind the title, *Mother of God*, must begin with Jesus, rather than Mary, as its focal point.

The unity of Christ in the fullness of his divinity and humanity is verified in the scriptures. The Gospel of John refers to his divine nature when St. Thomas, upon touching the wounds on Jesus' resurrected flesh, acknowledged his divinity when he acclaimed him as "My Lord and my God!" (John 20.28). St. Paul, in his Letter to Titus, encouraged Titus to live an upright and godly life "while we wait for...the manifestation of the glory of our great God and Savior, Jesus Christ." (Titus 2.12). St. Paul is referring to only one person, Jesus Christ, when he says God and Savior. The First Letter of John also acknowledges Christ's divinity where it is stated "we are in him who is true, in his Son Jesus Christ. He is the true God and eternal life." (1 John 5.20b). St. Paul, when writing about God's election of Israel, refers to Christ the Messiah as he "who is over all, God blessed forever." (Romans 5.20).


Not only is evidence of Jesus' divinity found in scripture, but divine attributes are also ascribed to him. The *Letter to the Colossians* describes him as creator "for in him all things in heaven and on earth were created" (Colossians 1.16a). The *Gospel of John* confirms this attribute by affirming that "All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being" (John 1.3). The *Gospel of John* also confirms that Jesus is worthy of the same honour that is afforded to God the Father (5.23).

Other scripture passages acknowledge Jesus Christ's humanity. The Gospel of Luke describes how Jesus, after his resurrection, appeared to his apostles, reminding them he is not a ghost but a flesh-and-blood man (Luke24.38-43). The Gospel of John begins a description of Jesus as the Word (Logos), who was with God and was God, who "became flesh and lived among us" (John 1.14a). The second chapter of St. Paul's Letter to the Philippians contains a passage that describes Jesus as having both the "form of God" and "human form" (2.6-11). This passage, an outstanding description of Jesus' nature, salvific mission and equality to God the Father, is an excellent example of early Christology (the theological study of Jesus Christ).

My earlier assertion that the meaning of the title *Mother of God* must begin with Jesus rather than Mary in no way diminishes her importance in salvation history. St. Paul, writing in his *Letter to the Galatians*, reminded the Christians in Galatia that "God sent his Son, born of a woman" (Galatians 4.4b). Mary is the true mother of Jesus, who first provided him with her own genetic information. (Mary would provide this exclusively


because Jesus had no biological father). She began as Jesus' biological mother, and would continue to provide motherly love, nourishment, and support as he grew and matured. While it is true Jesus pre-existed Mary, being eternal God, she however pre-existed his incarnation (enfleshment).

St. Paul compares Christ with Adam: Adam brought, through pride and disobedience, a rift between God and humankind (Genesis 3). Christ as a second Adam, however, would heal this rift by giving himself as a sacrifice for sin. Catholic scripture commentators discovered a similar relationship between Eve and Mary. Eve played a part in Adam's fall from friendship with God, but Mary, the new Eve, would help restore that friendship by giving birth to our salvation—Christ, the new Adam. She did this as the true mother of Jesus Christ, God and man.


